## **Re:** <u>Complaint of Crimes against Humanity Committed by the Ethiopian</u> <u>Government against the Anuak people.</u>

Dear Mr. Prosecutor,

TheAnuak Justice Council is submitting a claim to the International Criminal Courtof **Crimes against Humanity Committed by the Ethiopian Government against the Anuak People** pursuant to The Rome Statute of the InternationalCriminal Court where three elements that constitute crimes against humanitywere established: 1) the perpetration of an enumerated act, 2) committed aspart of a widespread or systematic attack directed against civilians, and 3) with the perpetrators having knowledge of the widespread or systematic attack. AlthoughEthiopia has not ratified the Rome Statute, crimes against humanity constitutecustomary international law and are thus applicable to and enforceable upon allstates.<sup>1</sup>

Based on a careful application of international legalstandards to the crimes committed, it is evident that the Ethiopian governmenthas committed the following crimes against humanity as defined in the statute: murder, deportation or forcible transfer of a population, rape, and the persecution of an identifiable group.

The Anuak Justice Council brings this claim regarding the actions of the Ethiopian Defense Forces of the Federal Democratic Republicof Ethiopia against the Anuak people of the Gambella region of Ethiopia. Theseactions reveal a pattern of serious and massive human and

peoples' rightsviolations. The Anuak Justice Council, non-profit, а nongovernmentalorganization, serves as an umbrella group of Anuak organizations, dedicated to increasing the quality of life for Anuak people. As such, the Anuak Justice Council respectfully seeks theinvolvement of the International Criminal Court in the intervention and thegranting of relief to the Anuak. Furthermore, the Anuak Justice Council alsorequests that the International Criminal Court conduct an in-depth study of thetreatment of the Anuak pursuant to Article 7(1) of the Rome Statute. Finally, the Anuak Justice Council requests a presence at the International CriminalCourt to present its communications directly to the Court.

The Anuak Justice Council is well aware of thechallenges that face the investigation of crimes of international concern andabove all of Crimes against Humanity committed by the Ethiopian governmentagainst the Anuak in the Gambella region. We fully intend to remain engaged inrespect to this matter and to do everything within our power to assist yourOffice and the Court in giving effect to the above recommendations.

In conclusion, the ethnic Anuak, who have been thevictims of Crimes against Humanity, deserve justice and reparations. Theirright to redress for the egregious crimes they suffered must not be overlooked.We look forward to hearing from you and to pursuing this dialogue with you onthese issues.
